Biographical Sketch

Theron B. Watkins (1877-1950), businessman, civic leader, and philanthropist, opened Watkins Brothers Funeral Home with his brother J. T. Watkins in 1909. Upon marrying Oliva Riley, T. B. Watkins adopted the Riley children.

Bruce Riley Watkins (1924-1980) was a dedicated public servant to the people of Kansas City and Jackson County, Missouri. One of the founding members of Freedom, Inc., in 1962, Watkins was also one of the first African Americans elected to the City Council of Kansas City, Missouri, in 1963. Watkins served in numerous civic roles during his distinguished career. In 1979, Watkins became the first African American to run for mayor of Kansas City, narrowly losing to opponent Richard Berkley.

Scope and Content Note

The collection consists of three series arranged by item type.

Series 1: Textual Materials, 1944-1981

This series consists of textual materials related to Watkins Bros. Funeral Home, the life and career of Bruce R. Watkins, and the Spirit of Freedom Fountain. The majority of materials in this series concern the Bruce R. Watkins' 1979 mayoral campaign, including campaign brochures, bumper stickers, flyers, and posters. Oversize bumper stickers have been withdrawn to oversize box 2; oversize posters have been withdrawn to map cabinet drawer 3.

Series 2: Photographs, 1936-1980

This series consists of photographs of Theron B. Watkins, Oliva Watkins Shaw, Bruce R. Watkins, and Watkins Bros. Funeral Home. A framed photograph of Bruce R. Watkins, ca. 1970s, is located at the back of the collection box.
