***Historical Sketch:***

Founded in 1903 by Reverend J. W. Hurse in the Belvidere Hollow neighborhood. The church's first building was at 604 Charlotte. Its next structure was located at 910 Harrison. They inhabited that space from 1921 until the building was lost to fire in 1938. The congregation then moved to its current location- the old Paseo Dance Hall at the corner of Truman Road and Paseo Blvd in 1941. The building was renovated by Ernest Bostrom in 1945. Hurse's successor was Rev. Raymond J. Jordan, who led the church from 1936 to 1944. Rev. John W. Williams, the third pastor and a civil rights activist from Texas, led the church from '44 to he retired in 1984. During his leadership, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. spoke at St Stephen in August 1957, and Rev. Williams led fundraising efforts for Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Hospital, which replaced Wheatley-Providence Hospital in 1972. Rev. Williams also founded the Greater Kansas City Baptist and Community Hospital Association, Inc, and was its first President in 1961. His statue resides in the grassy median on Paseo across the road from the church; erected in 1991. Rev. Mac Charles Jones (1984- 1996) followed Re. Williams, followed himself by Rev. Eric Duane Belt (1996- Present).

***Scope and Content Note:***
