Historical Sketch:

The bulk of the collection is made up from the sounds of Ragtime, a period of honky-tonk piano and brass bands. Ragtime originated in the 19th century where African Americans played what was known as march music and it became widely popular. During the 1920s, songbooks played a significant role in popular music consumption. People would buy songbooks to play their favorite tunes themselves.

Scope and Content Note:

The collection contains American songbooks from the early 20th century that ranges from 1905 to 1927. Many of the songbooks have sustained substantial amount damage and are very fragile. There are several popular publishers within the collection such as *Leo Feist, Inc. Music Publishing Company, Irving Berling Music Publishers, and the Waterson, Berlin & Synder Company.*
